## Member Spotlight: Amber Leatherwood

I grew up in east central Florida in north Merritt Island, a rural area some 45 miles east of Orlando. My mom and dad bought five acres of land just south of Kennedy Space Center. The Apollo space missions had ended several years before I was born and I entered the world in 1974, seven years before the first space shuttle was launched from our back yard.

From an early age I fell in love with animals. We had dogs, horses, ducks, chickens, peacocks, and cows at various times in my formative years. And, living just 20 minutes from the beach, I learned about the ocean and its nature. We also had a host of wildlife around us: alligators, manatees, dolphins, raccoons, possums, armadillos to name a few.

As most girls are naturally inclined, I was attracted to horses, and dreamed of being a world class rider in show jumping and dressage. Not forgetting the cows which I treated as almost human. We lived in a

two-story house and my mother set up a stained glass studio on the first floor underneath our living area on the second floor. My mom and I bottle fed a small calf called Niagara which once decided to prance around in the studio. It was like a bull in a china shop, or a cow in a glass shop!


My dad raised Charolais cattle for a time and I treated them as pets. I was about 6 years old when my dad bought the cows. One time, when my dad went fishing my mom, my sister Daisy, and I did the rounding up when the cattle escaped and ate our neighbor's oranges. On another occasion the cows got into the Space center restricted area, naughty cows.



As I grew, I spent summers in rural areas of Tennessee around Murfreesboro and decided at 17 to relocate to Tennessee for good. I met people in the Tennessee walking horse industry, owners, grooms, trainers, and entered competitions riding Tennessee Walkers, not to forget the cattle of which there are thousands in the state of Tennessee.

I finished my high school education in Tennessee and I went to work with the Williamson County Property Assessor's Office and bought a town home in Franklin, not far from my office. I made friends with many folk who had an interest in cattle and horses.

I met my husband Mike a few years back, and we got married in Jamaica last April. Mike started work in Thompson Station for Kix Brooks a country music star, and became a right hand man for his boss 20 plus years ago, driving a tour bus all over the US and Canada for Kix's music tours. Kix and his wife bought acreage in Thompson station, built houses and barns on the properties and raised cutting horses and cattle. Mike took on the responsibility together with Kix, of breeding and raising Beefmaster cattle. In addition to his bosses' cows, Mike has his own herd. The favorite bull is Smith & Wesson, from which have bred lots of new livestock both naturally and by artificial insemination. Painted Springs Beefmaster in Thompson Station is where we live and work (I still have a day job with the property assessor's office).



My participation in the cattle industry is looking after the Beefmaster cattle at Painted Springs with Mike and Kix, including feeding, herding, and I especially like nurturing the new born calves. Sometimes life on the farm as you all know, is no cakewalk. Winter months can be especially cruel, with freezing temperatures, long hours and making sure the cattle have enough good quality feed. I am a member of Beefmaster Breeders Cattlewomen and I'm a JBBA board member.

In my spare time I love to go horseback riding and camping with Mike and some friends. I also like to visit my fabulous family in Florida. Of course I love to be involved with the Beefmaster industry both here in Tennessee, and taking cattle for sale in other states.

## Someone's In The Kitchen: Cattlewomen Recipes

### Mediterranean Couscous Salad~~New Favorite Recipe

(Norma Jean Bounds)

Quick-cooking couscous lends to the 20-minute prep time of this Greek-style salad.

#### Ingredients

- 1 cup Progresso™ chicken broth (from 32-oz carton)
- 3/4 cup uncooked couscous
- 1 cup cubed plum (Roma) tomatoes (3 medium)
- 1 cup cubed unpeeled cucumber (1 small)
- 1/4 cup chopped green onions (about 4 medium)
- 1/4 cup chopped fresh or 1 tablespoon dried dill weed
- 2 tablespoons lemon juice
- 2 tablespoons olive or vegetable oil
- 1/8 teaspoon salt
- 2 tablespoons crumbled feta cheese

#### Directions

1. In 2-quart saucepan, heat broth to boiling. Stir in couscous; remove from heat. Cover; let stand 5 minutes.
2. In large bowl, place tomatoes, cucumber, olives, onions and dill weed. Stir in couscous.
3. In small bowl, beat lemon juice, oil and salt with wire whisk until well blended; pour over vegetable mixture and toss. Cover; refrigerate 1 hour to blend flavors.
4. Just before serving, sprinkle with cheese.

### Chicago Beef Sandwich

(Norma Jean Bounds)

#### Ingredients

- Rump Roast/Sirloin/Rd Steak
- 1 box of Beef Broth
- 1 Pkg. of Good Seasonings Italian Salad dressing Mix
- Pepperoncini peppers - amount wanted for spiciness
- Giardiniera peppers - amount wanted for spiciness (these are hot)
- French bread or hard rolls (pan toasted)
- Provolone cheese slices

#### Directions

1. Put meat in crock-pot, Italian salad mix on top, add peppers & then pour on Broth.
2. Cook on Low in crock pot approx.(10 hrs or till done or speed it up and put on high)
3. Pull apart with fork
4. Strain broth.

5. Serve meat on bread, add some Giardiniera peppers and a slice of provolone cheese. and add as much of the juice as you want. It can be a dry or wet sandwich. But the broth makes it.
6. \*\* It's almost as good as the Original Chicago Italian beef ones.
